SPRING TIME = BEES!

Spring time is here, and the all-important pollinators like honeybees and butterflies will soon be hard at work in our gardens and yards. Our Scotties are as curious as any dog when it comes to buzzing insects. Sometimes this leads to a painful lesson! The following information is taken from the Veterinary Information Network website for Client Information. Marcia Dawson

Any insect or spider can cause problems if they bite or sting your pet. A bite or sting can cause swelling, redness, and itching. Some animals can have an allergic reaction to a sting or bite that may result in mild hives, facial swelling, vomiting, difficulty breathing or even collapse.

What to Do:

- If the stinger can be found, scrape it out with a credit card or other stiff material. Alternatively, use tweezers by grasping the stinger, which is located below the venom sac. If the sting just happened, don't put pressure on the venom sac, as that would inject more of the venom into the pet.
- Apply cool compresses to the area.
- To help neutralize some of the acidic venom, apply a paste mixture of baking soda and water to the sting area.
- Your pet should be examined immediately by a veterinarian if there is facial swelling, breathing difficulty or collapse.

What NOT to Do:

- Do not administer any medications without first contacting your veterinarian or a veterinary emergency hospital. The veterinarian may need to examine your pet before recommending medications.

LEGISLATION by Susan Call

Many of you may be aware of recent legislative issues surrounding dog breeding in your area and around other states, and this issue has reared its ugly head in Ohio. In February of this year, the AKC sent a letter to the director of the Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA). This letter was sent due to the nature of the issue and strong objections, from home-based breeders in the state. Casual, small home-based breeders in the state would be required to obtain a pet store license, because they sell dogs in face to face transactions.

This came about from the 132 General Assembly asking the ODA to interpret the definition of “pet store”. There are a few detailed elements to this issue, but after the AKC was aware, they asked the ODA to cease any practices to require hobbyists and other breeders from being licensed as a “retail pet store”. The AKC’s opinion was it is an expansive interpretation of licensing laws, and believes the ODA is in contravention (an action that violates a law) of statutory language.

To clarify, this law would require a \$500 yearly pet store license fee, and fines if your dogs and/or kennel would not meet the ODA “criteria”. If breeders did not have a license, and were caught breaking the law, they could be fined up to \$10,000. It would not be difficult for officials to track down dogs registered in shows, due to the information owners and breeders give the AKC. How long could a small breeder survive financially and continue to breed their dogs if this scenario would happen?

With quick action from the AKC supporting the breeders, on March 7, ODA announced that they did suspend enforcement of the regulatory interpretation and will work with Ohio General Assembly on a resolution.

This is great news, but we cannot be complacent and sit back. We need to join our local kennel clubs and stand together. There is power in numbers who respond to programs in this country to make changes and prevent negative actions from groups who are against our sport and of our love of breeding purebred dogs.

There have been other states that have had similar attacks directed toward breeders, and this needs to be a wake-up call for us all. Write your congress, senate, state representative, and governor. A club in Ohio recently announced they are working with two breeder attorneys to set up a coalition to support the breeders and fight this legislation change.

Responsible breeders should be able to maintain the integrity, and strive to improve the standard of their breed, without legislative oversight.
